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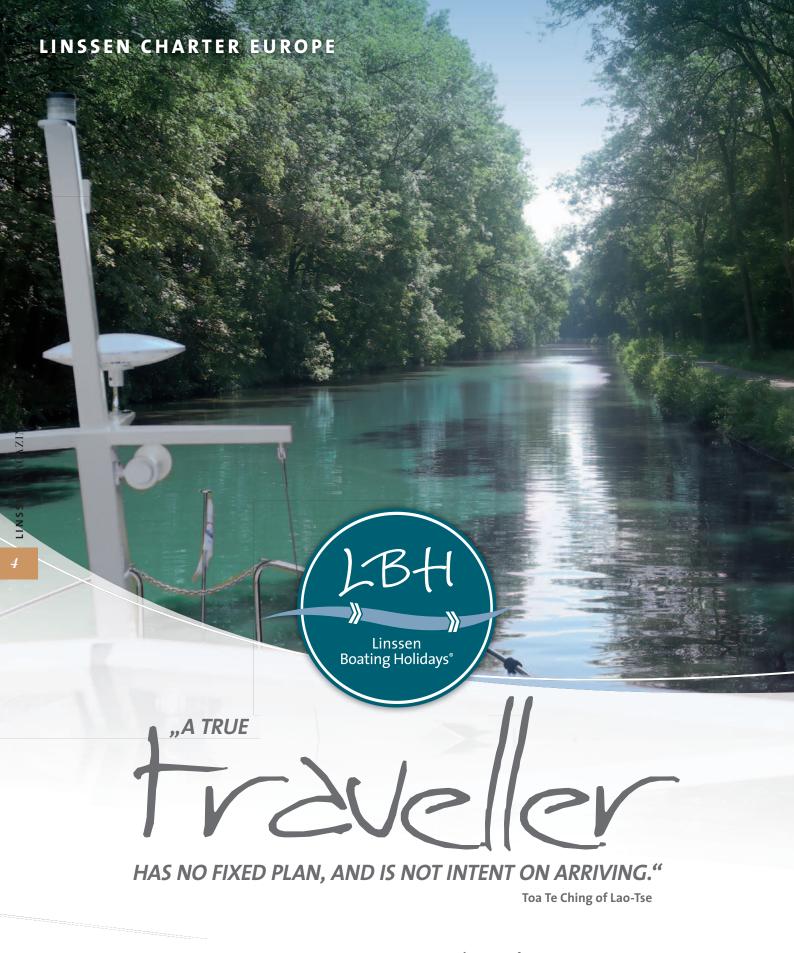

WITH A GENTLE RUSTLING SOUND, AN ENORMOUS BLACK CLOTH DROPPED FROM THE CEILING. FOR A MOMENT, ALL WAS SILENT... AND THEN THUNDEROUS AP-PLAUSE BROKE OUT. SHINING IN THE SPOTLIGHTS, THE FIVE NEW LINSSEN MOD-ELS WERE REVEALED TO THE AUDIENCE, WHICH HAD COME TO MAASBRACHT TO ENJOY A VIP EVENING AT THE LINSSEN YACHTS BOAT SHOW 2014.

Yvonne Linssen had just been talking about these five new models from Linssen Yachts. About the Classic Sturdy 36 Sedan Deckbridge, the Classic Sturdy 42 Sedan, the Grand Sturdy 30.9 Brilliant Edition, the Grand Sturdy 40.9 Brilliant Edition and the Grand Sturdy 52.9 AC Wheelhouse.

The Boat Show was organised differently this year. Only the five new models were on display in the Linssen Yachts showroom. With tables, chairs and little bars for the audience in front of their bows. This meant that people could enjoy nibbles and a drink under the prows of the shiny new yachts. The VIP evening attracted about 200 visitors. CLASSIC STURDY

For example, there was the Classic Sturdy 36 Sedan Deckbridge with the classic features of Linssen Sturdy styling: the large windows and warm mahogany interior. The white ceilings and Herreshoff-style wall panelling are a refreshing combination. And what really charmed the visitors was the deckbridge, a helmsman's position and 15 m2 more space.

Also on display was the new Classic Sturdy 42 Sedan. This model comes complete with the Linssen Variodeck, a







large sliding roof which you as the helmsman can operate to go from inside to outside in the wink of an eye.

BRILLIANT EDITIONS

What is striking about the Grand Sturdy 30.9 AC Brilliant Edition and the Grand Sturdy 40.9 AC Brilliant Edition is their modern deep grey colour. The interior also has that really contemporary look.

GRAND STURDY 52.9 AC WHEELHOUSE

But the hit of the evening was definitely the Grand Sturdy 52.9 AC Wheelhouse (see also page 30 onwards). It's the biggest yacht that Linssen Yachts has built to date. And that's plain to see. Visitors were surprised at the roominess of the boat, with a spacious cabin fore and aft with a double bed, shower and toilet and a central cabin with two single beds that can be converted to a double bed. But it's the split-level saloon, the view from the generously proportioned saloon, with a roomy corner seat and separate seats, to the U-shaped pantry and dinette situated opposite with a large dining table, that is really prized and makes the boat look even more spacious.

These five models were much talked about for a long time afterwards, for example in the Roosterhoove hotel in nearby Roosteren where the owners clubs from different countries traditionally meet over the Boat Show weekend.

The visitors on the Saturday and Sunday couldn't get enough of Linssen Yachts' five new models either.

INITIATIVE

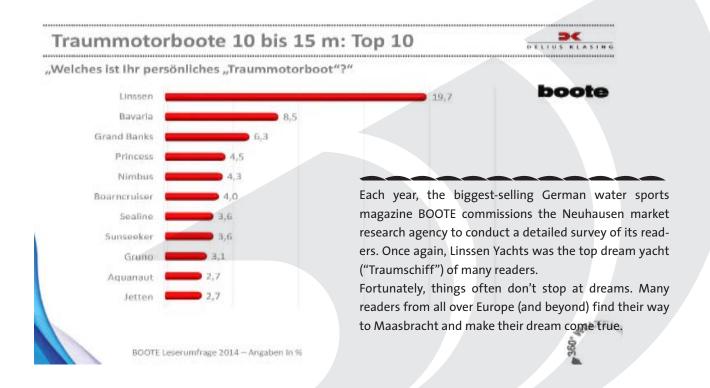

Turkey has a rich history involving many cultures such as the Hittites, Assyrians, Greeks, Armenians, Persians, Seljuks, and Ottomans. The fact that there are still so many intact historical buildings in Turkey is because the Ottomans often carried out restoration work.

Major historical towns and cities such as Istanbul, Bursa Edirne, and Izmir are very popular with tourists, but there are hundreds of historical sites throughout the country, for example the many now ruined Greek cities of Troy, Ephesus, Pergamon, Miletus, Priene, Aphrodisias, Sagalassos, Xanthos, Side, Phaselis, and Didyma.

Besides in Finland, a Linssen dealer also began representing us in Sweden last year. Linssen Yachts Sweden is based in Bromma, to the west of Stockholm, not far from Bromma/Stockholm Airport.

A characteristic feature of the Swedish coast are the many skerries, hundreds of little islands which are actually the tops of hills rising up above water from the seabed. Between them, the waters are often sheltered, so that the sailing is excellent.

The great thing about the Swedish coast is the beautiful scenery and the picturesque fishing villages with their typical wooden houses painted in different colours.

The Göta Canal is perhaps Sweden's most important engineering feat of yesteryear as regards hydraulic engineering. It is a 190 kilometre blue ribbon running from Gothenburg in the west to Sjötorp in the east and is Sweden's top destination for motorboat cruisers.

For a long time, the canal was of vital economic, infrastructural, and strategic importance for the country. Today, though, it is primarily a recreational magnet for water sports enthusiasts, cyclists and walkers. Each year, some 3 million tourists visit the canal and the attractive places along its banks. Because it is so long, you can always find somewhere to enjoy peace and quiet.

Finland is often called the "land of a thousand lakes". That's not surprising, because there really are a lot of them! In fact the Finnish landscape is defined by lakes and the sea. The Saimaa region is in the southwest of Finland and is part of Southern Savonia (Etelä-Savo). The area around the town of Savonlinna is renowned as the country's prime holiday landscape, stretching from Varkaus in the west to Joensuu in the east and from Kuopio in the north to Lappeenranta in the south. The whole region covers 1700 km2 and, if you include all the islands, has a coastline of no less than 13,700 km. You can explore this region as the skipper of your "own" Linssen and discover the splendid waterways and harbours that are full of the local joie de vivre.

The region includes many cultural sites, with the world-famous opera festival in Savonlinna, top-class concerts, and fascinating museums and galleries. The sunny shores of Lake Saimaa offer everything you need for a lovely holiday. Charming boutiques, idyllic cafes, and top restaurants are there to welcome you, and contribute

to the charm that is so characteristic of the area around Savonlinna. For cruising, one of the most popular parts is the Linnansaari National Park, with 130 islands covering an area of some 40 km2. The park has 21 marinas, so it's never hard to find somewhere to moor. Moreover, you can always just tie up somewhere for a while to have a meal or make coffee over an open fire. If you're in luck, you'll see one of Saimaa's famous ringed seals, the most endangered seal species in the world.

Besides the harbours in the Linnansaari National Park, the region has more than 200 other marinas, which makes it easy to plan your trip. And because it's Finland, a lot of these places have a traditional sauna where you can relax and then cool off in the crystal-clear waters of the lake.

Your trip will take you to lots of natural harbours too and you are permitted to spend one or two nights on almost all of the islands. This lively area amidst the idyllic Saimaa region is the perfect setting for a cultural, spa, beach, or cruising holiday – or a combination of all four. You can escape from the stresses of day-to-day life on your yacht, moored alongside the quay with the market and outdoor cafes of a pleasant summery town close at hand. THE MICHELS FAMILY HAS CLOCKED UP ALMOST 120 YEARS WITH LINSSEN

THEY ARE BECOMING A RARITY, EMPLOYEES WITH FORTY OR MORE YEARS OF SERVICE WITH THE SAME FIRM. BUT LINSSEN YACHTS STILL HAS A FEW. ONE IS JAN MICHELS, WHO HAS BEEN WITH LINSSEN FOR MORE THAN FIFTY YEARS. BUT HE'S NOT THE ONLY ONE IN THE MICHELS FAMILY: HIS BROTHER PIET HAS BEEN WORKING WITH US FOR MORE THAN 45 YEARS. SO IT WASN'T SO STRANGE THAT JAN'S SON BJÖRN JOINED US SEVENTEEN YEARS AGO. ALL IN ALL, THEY'RE A FAMILY WHO REALLY CARE ABOUT LINSSEN YACHTS.

Björn is now 34 and as a nine-year-old he already went along with his dad Jan to the Linssen Yachts yard on Saturdays. There was always something to do there: moving boats, preparing for trade fairs, or drawing up job sheets. "Other kids went out to play, but I went with my dad to move boats around. I went and sat in the car as early as possible every Saturday morning so that dad wouldn't forget to take me along with him. I rode on the forklift, or when dad had to draw up job sheets I sat next to him doing my own drawings." "And he really loved it if the forklift had a flashing light too!", says Björn's father Jan (66) with a smile.

Jan started work with Linssen in 1964, as a carpenter, later becoming a foreman, but he did a lot of other work besides. "I did internal transport, installed engines, and even carried out major repairs to the boats," says Jan. "That was what it was like back then." Jan is actually retired, but if you ask how often he can still be found at the Linssen yard, father and son both instantly answer "Every afternoon!" Last year was Jan's fiftieth year with Linssen. And no, he still can't really leave. "It's become a hobby for

me", he says. Jan mainly still deals with transporting the yachts, but he's also there at boat shows and trade fairs: "It's nice to still be involved," he says.

Jan's brother Piet (61) joined the firm in 1969. "I was also taken on as a carpenter. 'Go and saw some wood", they told me. But I wasn't really a carpenter at all, I was a fitter!" says Piet with a laugh. "Fortunately I was able to switch to the hull workshop the next day. That was how things worked back then." Piet now deals mainly with the internal transport, and he hoists boats into and out of the water.

In 1998, it was Björn's turn to join the firm. After a year as a trainee with various companies, he was taken on by the last one – yes, Linssen Yachts. "I was overjoyed," he says. The Logicam 2 interior hall is now the place where foreman Björn works. There are twelve yachts lined up under construction. Björn loves to talk about "his" bit of Linssen: "The advent of Logicam is the biggest change that I've been involved in," says Björn. It used to be that the yachts stayed in the same place for all the different work to be done, from installing the engine and the woodwork right through to the finishing. Today, they move up one

place along the Logicam II line (with yachts of between 40 and 46 feet) every 10 days, with work being done on another part of the vessel at each workplace. Basically, a yacht comes into the hall as a painted hull and leaves it fully finished. "It's much more efficient," says Björn. "It used to be that we went to the boat, but now it comes to us. What makes it interesting is the logistics involved. For me, it's a challenge to makes sure that the other guys can do their work at their place in the line." Each of the workplaces is equipped with trolleys with all the necessary stuff: engine parts, ceiling panels, the woodwork for the forward cabin, flooring, etc., etc. Each interior fitter also has his own box of tools. On the inside of the lid, Björn's has photos of his two daughters (who are one and six years old). So the next generation of the Michels family is already on the way! "Yes," grins Björn, "My elder daughter already knows her way around here - especially how to find the vending machine!"

After leaving the Logicam hall, the yachts are lowered into the water, a job that is dealt with by Piet Michels. Just as we step outside, Piet's colleague Jo Linssen arrives towing a big grey hull. Right away, Piet pulls on his work gloves and starts to help. The hull has to be transferred to a different cradle. "There are only a few people who can do this work," says Jan, "You need to be a really well coordinated team." The yacht is quickly switched to the other cradle and Jo and Piet take it away to the sandblasting cabin. "We developed the system with the cradles ourselves," says Piet. "It used to take half an hour to get a boat onto the blocks."

A few minutes later, a Grand Sturdy 470 needs to be removed from the Logicam 3 hall, and it is immediately clear just what a precision job it is to transport a boat. Piet carefully inserts the forks under the cradle and slowly, the boat starts to move. Guided by Jo and Jan, Piet Dick

tows the almost 15 metre-long Grand Sturdy out of the row of boats, and – with only decimetres to spare on either side – manoeuvres the colossus out of the hall.

"What outsiders don't realise, says Jan Michels, "is that at any one time there are about seventy yachts at the Linssen yard." "That used to be different," adds Piet. "When we started, there was just a single building and we built each boat there from start to finish." The advent of the computer in the 1990s meant big changes for Piet and Jan. "We used to have to measure up and cut out everything ourselves," says Piet, "but now the whole boat comes in as a kind of kit and we just need to put it all together." "Back then, there was also more contact with customers," says Jan. They came to look at what we were doing and sometimes you had to take off five centimetres, or add a bit. Nowadays, it's all drawn and machined via the computer. Accepting that was a bit difficult, I have to say."

But customers do still come now and again to see their boat being built. "That's great," says Björn. When he started work at Linssen, the interior of each yacht still used to be drawn out on the floor so that the customer could look at it and discuss it. "And it's not as if we can no longer customise the boat to fit in with a customer's wishes," he adds. Nowadays, though, it's the people from the sales department or the work planning department who do that."

Björn can't imagine working anywhere else. "My work is very varied, and I still regularly need to operate the crane or the forklift. I also go to a lot of trade fairs at weekends, either to represent Linssen or just as my hobby, along with my dad. So I'm involved with a lot of different aspects of the business, which makes working at Linssen really enjoyable."

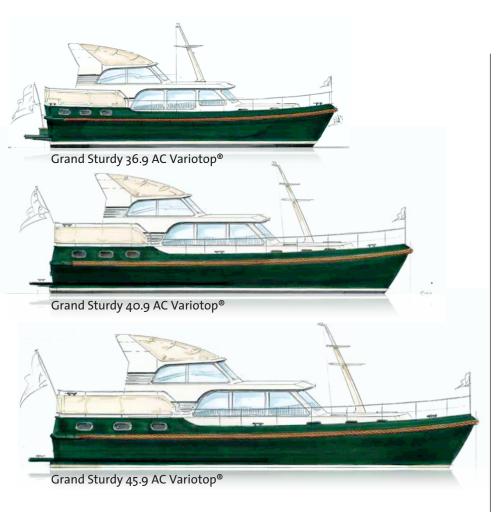

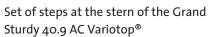


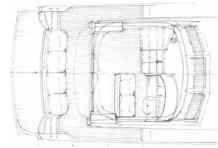

CROATIA: AMONG EUROPE'S MOST BEAUTIFUL AREAS FOR CRUISING

MORE THAN TWO THOUSAND YEARS OF HISTORY, AN IMPRESSIVE LANDSCAPE, SECLUDED BAYS, AND HARBOURS BOTH TRANQUIL OR BUSTLING – CROATIA HAS EVERYTHING THAT A CRUISING ENTHUSIAST COULD DESIRE. WITH OUR GRAND STURDY 40.9 SEDAN, WE COULD VIEW CROATIA FROM A NEW PERSPECTIVE!

And to say it right away: we have been sailing the Adriatic in a number of different vessels since back in the 1980s, but none was as comfortable and safe as the Hippo – a well-deserved name! Although the Adriatic is often derided as "just a bathtub", things can get very uncomfortable when the cold "Bora" wind sweeps down from the mountains and churns up the sea. But even in weather conditions that had made our solid old motorsailer creak and groan, and we had felt better off with lifejackets on, the Linssen lived up to its name and lay there unconcerned like a big heavy hippo in the water. But let's begin at the beginning.

After its maiden voyage on the Meuse, Waal and Rhine, we took over the new boat at Izola (Slovenia) on 6 June 2013 and set off to enjoy the transfer trip to our home marina at Simuni on the island of Pag (Croatia). The coasts of Slovenia and Istria were still very busy, with a lot of buoys marking obstacles that we had to look out for. But

despite it being the holiday season, things got less busy after we had crossed the Kvarner Gulf and left the coast of Istria. We naturally stopped off in Rovinj before the crossing. The town has a long and turbulent history. The Romans called it "Ruginium", which the Slavs changed to "Rovinj" in the seventh century. Rovinj is well worth a visit. The townscape has been shaped by its rich history, with winding alleys and an overall Romanesque-Gothic appearance, but with renaissance, baroque, and neoclassical buildings too. Particularly striking is the Basilica of St Euphemia, whose 60 m-high seventeenth-century tower is topped by a 4.70 m-high bronze statue of Euphemia herself, the patron saint of the town.

Another interesting town is Pula, with a history dating back 7000 years. In 177 BC, it was captured by the Romans, who built an amphitheatre there in the reign of the Emperor Augustus that is now one of the main sights. Other remains from the Augustan period are the Temple

of Rome and Augustus, the partly preserved city walls with their gates, and the remains of two theatres.

After a two-week voyage with several stopovers at historically notable locations and secluded, picturesque coves, we reached our base at Simuni on the island of Pag. We have been coming here for many years, and we really enjoy the homely atmosphere of one of the smallest marinas on the Croatian coast. Pag is famous for its lace, which is still painstakingly produced by hand, and its sheep's milk cheese, now made in cheese dairies partly modernised with funds from the EU. The milk comes from sheep that graze on the mostly very poor soils - often apparently consisting only of scree - throughout the island and also on the generally uninhabited neighbouring islands. When you cast anchor in the bays of these uninhabited islands (for example Maun), you may quite possible see the sheep come down to the beach in the evening to drink water from the sea. It is supposedly this and the saline meadows that give the cheese its distinctive taste. Another interesting feature are the olive trees – some up to 1500 years old - around Lun at the northwest end of Pag. As on the other Croatian islands, the production of olive oil is an important part of the economy.

Located in central Dalmatia (about an hour's drive from Zadar), Pag is the ideal starting point for cruises both short and long. In deciding on the "Longtop" Sedan – i.e. the model with an extended roof over the cockpit – we were influenced by our previous experience in the area: intense sunshine, which not only heats up the sea significantly (in June already up to 28° C) but can also be hard on the skipper and his crew. So our chosen model is also



suitable for pale-skinned northern Europeans! However, this kind of boat is not very frequent in the Adriatic, and we have already become accustomed to being gazed at in every harbour that we visit. Even the owners of sleek yachts have to admit that the Linssen offers an impressive degree of comfort. That also applies in rough seas and conditions that are a challenge for sailors and that keep those fast, sleek yachts in the harbour.

So much for our boat. In June 2014, we used the first part of our stay in Croatia for some short trips, which we'd like to tell you about. From the ACI Marina at Simuni, we set a course of 330° past the lively harbour town of Novalja - popular especially among younger visitors to Croatia and past the island of Pag to Rab. To starboard, we could see the ancient olive trees around Lun that we already mentioned. Near the headland lies the sleepy little village of Tovarnele. Drawing level with the buoys marking the shallows, we changed course to 350° and sailed directly into the bay at Cifnata. The sandy bottom is ideal for anchoring, and although the bay is frequented by daytrippers, they leave in the evening in small yachts or taxi boats. We reached this intermediate destination at a leisurely 5,5 knots in just under 5 hours, and prepared for the night. We enjoyed the quiet of the evening and after breakfast set course the next morning for the harbour at Rab (44° 45' N, 14° 46' E). We were greeted there by the four striking bell towers of the historic centre, which is built on a steep rocky ridge. At the harbour entrance, we came across a whole armada of boats both large and small – like a swarm of mosquitoes – that were on their way to the numerous bathing inlets. That was fine by us, because it meant more space in the harbour. The marina is situated opposite the quay of the town's harbour and is a very convenient place to moor. But for an hourly charge of 20 kunas (about EUR 2.50) you can also moor alongside the guay itself. The Linssen's bow and stern thrusters meant that "parking" was not any problem. The advantage of mooring by the quay is that you have easy access to the town centre: you don't have to walk around the harbour basin as you do if you tie up in the marina. Rab is over 2000 years old, and with narrow lanes and many churches has a special flair all of its own. With Rovinj and Zadar, it counts as an historic and cultural gem of northern Croatia. There are numerous excellent restaurants, but we will mention only two. One is the stylish "Paradiso", in the old town loggia and the Cernota Palace, which also has its own picture gallery, which the owner is happy to show to visitors. The slivovitz and the house wine are both produced by the restaurant itself. The link with the coast is also shown in various items that give the restaurant its exclusive atmosphere.

The "Rab" tavern is in a rustic but refined style. With its wooden beams and a welcoming gallery, it has a tradi-



tional atmosphere and its excellent but inexpensive dishes make it really worth a visit. It's striking that younger people in Croatia prefer to communicate in English, while older people usually understand German better. But basically, there are no communication problems. On this cruise, by the way, there were five of us on board the Linssen, but none of us felt there was too little room. One reason is of course that the cockpit offers plenty of space, although a cover needs to be put up if it rains.

After a good meal and some extensive sightseeing, we left Rab in the evening so as to spend the night at Cifnata again. Next morning we set a course 253° for the island of Cres. During the crossing, we were in fact caught out by a moderate Bora wind, making it seem sensible to stop over and spend the night in the bay of Toverafi ica on Cres. That also made things a bit easier for our guests, who weren't such experienced sailors. Next day, we rounded the island to the southeast and sailed comfortably through the Lofiinjski Channel, with Cres to starboard and Lofiinj to port, to the little town of Osor. At Osor, the islands of Cres and Losinj are separated by a canal – only 11 metres wide – that was constructed more than 2000 years ago. The bridge over the canal is opened twice a day, at 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. For the vessels that are waiting, there is an area with buoys and a clearly marked navigation channel. The buoys enabled us to tie up and use our Zodiac dinghy to go ashore. The Zodiac is equipped with a 4 hp Torpeedo electric outboard motor, allowing for elegant and almost silent operation.

In Roman times, Osor was a strategically important centre with about 20,000 inhabitants, because the sea route from Aquileia to Salonae passed through the Osor Canal. Surrounded by strong defensive walls, it was the site of numerous temples, a forum, theatres, and palaces. The harbour was the base for Ravenna's navy, and in 530 AD, the town became the seat of a bishop. It was later devastated by the Saracens and sank into insignificance. To-

day's Osor is a village of scarcely 100 residents, with ancient remains that are well worth seeing.

We continued on a course of 148° past Losinj to starboard and Orjule to port to the island of Ilovik. At the southeastern tip of Losinj there is a small uninhabited island, Kozjak, which we rounded, keeping it to port and looking for a suitable bay to anchor off the west side of Ilovik. We decided to anchor in the bay of Pažine in the south of the island and to finish the day there.

Next morning, we set a course of 132° for Ugljan, passing by Silba (to port) and Premuda and Ist (to starboard). At the southern tip of the island of Silba we had to correct our course again slightly so as to pass Sestrunj (to starboard), with the offshore islands of the Tri Sestrice, to reach the island of Ugljan. We moored at the "Olive Island" marina at Sutomiscica, a brand-new marina leaving nothing to be desired.

After a restful night in the marina and after replenishing our stores (including water) we set course for Zadar. Ugljan and Zadar are separated by the Pafimanski Channel, which we crossed in less than an hour, tying up at the town's marina. Getting into this marina is a tight squeeze, and a bit of a challenge for a 40-foot vessel. The Linssen is somewhat cumbersome, but using its bow and stern thrusters enabled us to moor without problems, although without the additional rudder, things would have been extremely difficult. We can't really recommend this marina because it is extremely expensive and crowded. Although we were only moored for a few hours so we could do some sightseeing, we were immediately charged for 24 hours (including for unnecessary water and electricity!), whereas at all the other marinas there is also a charge for just half a day. So what you need to do is either stay for the whole time you've paid for or go to the Borik marina instead. As we've already seen, Zadar is a real gem and very much worth visiting. It's no wonder that the AIDA cruise ships put in here too. The ferries that are constantly coming and going also need a lot of space, so we were glad - especially after our days of peace and tranquillity – to get away from the hustle and bustle.

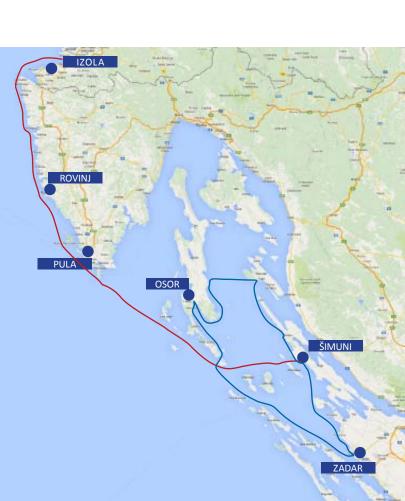
On the way back to the island of Pag, we once more moored off the island of Vir, and could admire a spectacular sunset, which compensated for the stress at Zadar. One thing that this cruise showed us is that the Longtop model of the Grand Sturdy Sedan is ideal as far as we're concerned for sailing in this area. Croatia's membership of the EU has led to changes in the conditions for yachts. The important thing now is no longer the length of the vessel but the power of the engine. That made this year's permit significantly cheaper than in the past.

The Hippo has an engine speed of from 1800 to 1850 revs per minute, producing 5.5 to 6 knots (diesel consumption: about 5 litres per hour). That is rather slow compared to the usual yachts in the Adriatic, but we're not in any hurry. People often talk of "slowing down and starting living" – that's what we actually managed to do! In return, the boat is extremely reliable, and remains docile even in rough seas. There's enough space even when you have guests on board, and we have come to appreciate the storage space too. A Fritz!Box and the connected stick allowed us to connect up with the rest of the world via the Internet, and there was a stable WLAN network on board for our mobile phones, iPad, and other devices. We hadn't thought about installing an additional external antenna for all this, so we had to make do with an after-market antenna with a magnetic base, which we extended out through the sliding roof in areas with a weak signal. When sailing in this area, I advise bow and stern thrusters and auto pilot. We also think it's absolutely necessary to be able to cover the cockpit with a cover during bad weather.

Finally, we would like to record that Linssen doesn't just build top-quality vessels but also provides a first-class service. That more or less guarantees that the "best weeks of the year" will be just what we want, namely totally relaxing!

The Grand Sturdy 52.9 is available in two versions, either with the Wheelhouse or with the unique Linssen-Variotop®, the fully automatic folding roof.

The Wheelhouse version is equipped with a large electric sliding roof and the luxurious Longtop extended roof covering the entire width of the aft deck, with integrated LED lighting in the ceiling. The wide gangways next to the wheelhouse are also covered and have stylish Longtop supports on the port and starboard sides for a real mega yacht feel.

When the teak doors are open, a single huge living space is created between the wheelhouse and the aft deck. The aft deck has integrated deck boxes (including faux leather cushions) and a large teak table. The wheelhouse contains the wet bar with fridge, sink with hot and cold water and the Linssen Yachts glass set.

More sitting space can easily be created by extending the bench in the wheelhouse. Simply slide out the integrated sitting section to create a spacious L-shaped bench.

SALOON

Together with the galley and dinette, the spacious saloon consists of one large open space. Needless to say, the 52.9 has a radio/CD/DVD player with speakers in the saloon and wheelhouse, which are operated using the Raymarine multifunction instrument. The TV, with a Glomex DVB-T antenna, is located on the starboard side and the unique split-level saloon connects the spacious saloon with the dinette and pantry to form one big space.

PANTRY AND DINETTE

The galley is particularly roomy. Every available inch of space has been used extremely efficiently. Standard features include a 281-litre fridge with a 61-litre freezer, an induction cooker with 4 induction zones, stainless steel microwave/oven/grill, Corian worktop, Magic Corner cupboard, including racks and stainless steel sink. A built-in dishwasher also comes as standard.

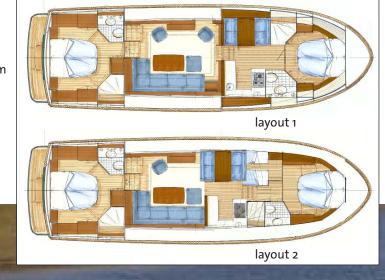

FROM MAASBRACHT TO LAKE SAIMAA

The yacht left Maasbracht on 12 May 2014 and was taken by lorry to Heiligenhafen on the north German coast, where it was launched on 14 May.

Next day we stocked up with the necessary stores and the trip could really begin. We left at about noon on 15 May, passing under the Fehmarn Sound Bridge shortly after. There was a gentle north-westerly breeze, which dropped even more, so that the rest of our voyage across the Baltic Sea was under clear blue skies. It was wonderful to watch the porpoises swimming right next to us in the clear water.

In the course of a few days, we sailed north along the Danish and Swedish coasts, putting in for the night at Ystad, Karlskrona, Kalmar, Oxelösund, Dalarö, and Sandhamn. From there, we set out for the crossing to our own country. On 22 May – seven days and almost 1000 kilometres after setting out – we arrived at the Finnish island of Kökar, halfway between Sweden and Finland.

From there, the next stage was about 235 kilometres to Helsinki. The temperature increased, and when we arrived in the Finnish capital it was a 27° C.

We spent two days in Helsinki for some maintenance work and to have a bit of a rest, and on 27 May we set out on the last stretch of our journey. This took us via the Saimaa Canal, the first section of which is on Russian territory and is leased out to Finland. Our last stop before

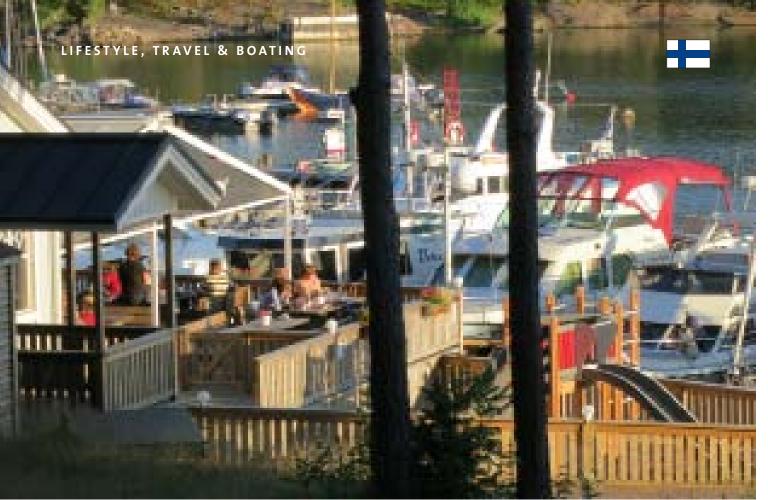
Russia was at the island of Santio. Here we were inspected by the Finnish border patrol, and all our papers were checked. Next morning, we set off to cross the border and enter the canal. Conditions were exceptionally calm, and the final section at sea presented no problems. Before entering the lock in Russia, we filled up with cheap fuel and we were checked by the Russian border police. All went well and we could quickly continue on our way. On 30 May we arrived late in the evening in Lappeenranta, after "only" 43 kilometres, 8 locks, and an ascent to 76.7 metres above sea level. We also had no problems on the final leg of the journey to our home port at Partakoski.

TUR 35 was home!

CRUISING IN FINLAND

EVERY YEAR, MORE AND MORE BOATS WITH FOREIGN FLAGS ARE VISITING FINLAND. MANY OF THEM ARE TOURING THE BALTIC. SOME ARE JUST CRUISING AROUND THE FINNISH COASTLINE AND ENJOYING THE THOUSANDS OF ISLANDS.

Finland has a relatively long coastline. It extends from the Swedish border at Tornio at the most northerly point of the Gulf of Bothnia to the Russian border at the eastern point of the Gulf of Finland. The Åland Islands lie fifty miles off the south-west corner of the mainland.

The south-western archipelago and the Åland Islands together form the Archipelago Sea. With over 40,000 islands, it is the largest archipelago in Europe and one of the largest in the world. These sheltered waters are a real cruising paradise.

The cruising season in Finland starts in early May and continues until late September. The summer months from June to August are the high season. During holidays, some of the most popular harbours may be very crowded. Most of the guest marinas close their doors at end of August. Mooring is also possible at other times, but services may be restricted. In Finland, it is also possible to moor at natural harbours. You can legally moor, swim and rest anywhere as long as you do not disturb other people and provided that access has not been restricted for defence

or environmental reasons. Needless to say, you must not moor too close to private homes or private boat clubs. During the summer months, the days are long and it never really gets dark in archipelago. The weather is usually very predictable. Strong winds are rare during summer. At worst, it may be wet with temperatures around 10°-15° C. At best, summer temperatures may exceed 30° C and the sun is so strong that it's hardly possible to walk on the deck with bare feet. Thunderstorms may occur suddenly

even during good weather. But the archipelago, with its thousands of islands, provides sheltered waters where it's safe to cruise even in bad weather.

Cruising and navigation in Finland are relatively easy. However, it's essential to have up-to-date charts. The Finnish coast and archipelago are well known for underwater rocks, so following recommended channels is advisable. These channels are very well marked with guaranteed draught.

There are plenty of things to do besides enjoying the marine life and beautiful views. The archipelago is full of history going back to seal hunters living in the area over 3,000 years ago. During the Viking times, many important sea routes crossed the Archipelago Sea. Finland was part of Sweden until 1808 and subsequently the most westerly part of the Russian Empire for over one hundred years. These periods also left their mark on the cities, villages and islands across the archipelago. Nearly every island or village has its own museum or exhibition introducing the local history. There are wonderful walking routes taking in historic places and local wildlife. Boat enthusiasts can also enjoy water sports, as well as other activities including tennis and golf. Perhaps the greatest attraction in the Finnish archipelago is the local food and the culinary experiences that can be enjoyed in various small restaurants and shops. There are plenty of local specialities, but the most famous are smoked fish and local bread.

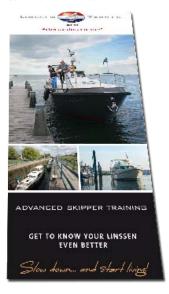
